Dieudonné held after 'Charlie' Facebook post

From the French edition of <u>Prosecutors had opened the case</u> <u>against him on Monday</u> after he posted "Tonight, as far as I'm concerned, I feel like Charlie Coulibaly" — mixing the popular slogan "Je Suis Charlie" used in homage to the journalists killed at magazine Charlie Hebdo, with a reference to gunman Amedy Coulibaly.

Coulibaly killed four Jews at a Jewish supermarket on Friday and a policewoman the day before.

The comedian made international headlines in 2013 when French footballer Nicolas Anelka was banned for five matches by English football authorities for using a hand-gesture created by Dieudonné that many people consider anti-Semitic.
