Michael Deacon in <u>Pink News</u>, the NUS Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender conference has <u>Peter Tatchell is a racist</u>. Then they tell us the founder of Hope Not Hate is an Islamophobe. And now they tell us gay men are bigots.
